Report of Field Trip to Hog Island (4/23/2022)

The Hampton Roads Bird Club April Field Trip was at Hog Island on Saturday (4/23/2022). Our group of seven birders met at 7:00 AM and headed through the gate into Hog Island. We tallied 62 species between 7:00 AM and noon. We had great views of Orchard Oriole, Prairie Warbler, and Great Crested Flycatcher. We also had exciting close views of White-eyed Vireo (WEVI) breeding behavior. We saw one WEVI nest under construction and one complete nest with a bird incubating eggs. Bald Eagle numbers were very high and active, and we flushed two Bobwhite Quail. Despite higher water levels, we did have some shorebirds including both Yellowlegs and Least Sandpiper. The best bird of the day was the pair of Black-necked Stilt towards the end of the main road.

I took this photo of the Nuthatch looking for a handout. I used the Nikon D500 using the 200-500 mm lens at the 320 position at 1/640 sec at f/5.6 with ISO 450."

Warming drives half of long-term change in European birds

Concerned about a decline in the population of your favorite species of migrant warbler at Sandy Bottom? Is it mostly due to global warming (the airline CO2 from your neighbor's last 30,000 km big year) or the delicious brew that you ground up this morning (the new coffee plantation decided to clear cut rather than grow shaded beneath a natural forest canopy)? Might be hard to answer now. But six Australian and European scientists have attempted to split the impacts of climate from "other" sources of change on bird characteristics. They've cut some ice. First author Nina McLean used a mine of quality data: several decades of detailed citizen science records from the UK and the Netherlands, two countries with strong birding cultures. The team concentrated on 60 species and just three traits, egg laying date, offspring number and body condition. This involves the judicious interpretation of time series. By diagnosing partial derivatives of the three factors for each species with respect to year, the authors tried to parse the change of the traits with time due to "temperature pathway" versus "other pathway" (various not-separately quantified effects of agriculture, urbanization, predation, pollution, etc.).

For most reported species, the laying date moved earlier. But the Long-eared Owl is now generally laying eggs later; and by both the temperature pathway and the other pathway, the number of offspring for this species is increasing. And for the Common Redstart (unrelated to the American Redstart), the same two pathways also increased the offspring count over time.

"Across species, approximately half of the magnitude of changes in traits could be attributed to rising mean temperature, suggesting that increasing temperatures are likely the single most important contributor to temporal trends and emphasizes the impact that global warming is having on natural populations. There were also substantial nontemperature-related temporal trends (presumably due to other changes such as urbanization), which generally caused trait change in the same direction as warming."

The results appeared in an American journal. Holler if you want the pdf.
